Community Outreach Update on Our Fiscal Sustainability

As the Placentia community is aware, depleted local revenues and historical State takeaways have left Placentia with a \$6.1 million structural deficit. Because of this, certain basic City services and maintenance continue to be deferred. Over \$3 million a year for the past 7 years in street and road maintenance have been deferred. In addition, Placentia currently maintains a proactive Police presence in our neighborhoods, parks, and schools. These services may be reduced in the years to come, impacting our quality of life and our property values.

The City Council has approved the continuation of the Citizens Fiscal Sustainability Task Force to examine the City's revenue structure and structural budget deficit for next year's budget and to make recommendations for creating new revenues and/or reducing costs. 

Community Workshop on the Old Town Santa Fe District

The City will be hosting a community workshop on the Old Town Santa Fe District Plan on **Wednesday, February 17, 2016 at 7:00 p.m.** at the Placentia Senior Center, 143 S. Bradford Avenue. The City is in the process of developing a plan to improve and position the City's historic Old Town District to better connect with other areas of the City. The Santa Fe District is an asset to the City and is poised to be one of the City's key destinations, particularly with the new Metrolink Train Station coming soon. The purpose of the Plan is to enhance the historic significance of the area while creating public spaces and pathways to make a cohesive walkable urban environment with retail, restaurants, offices, and community facilities. In addition to the Plan, the current zoning code provisions for the existing "Santa Fe Commercial District" will be amended to provide development standards for new infill construction and revitalization. PUBLIC WORKS

Public Works Department Update

Public Works staff continued to perform maintenance activities throughout the city. The Graffiti Crew removed graffiti per work order requests. The Sign Shop repaired and replaced signs on Yorba Linda Boulevard, Kraemer Boulevard, Placentia Avenue and Santa Fe Street. The Patch Crew filled potholes on arterial streets. The Ballfield Maintenance Crew worked on infields at the Sports Complex, Tuffree Park and Tori Hunter Field. The Facility Maintenance Crew completed work orders at City buildings and repaired lights at Kraemer Park and City Hall. The Maintenance crews cleaned the downtown area and debris on arterial streets.

As a reminder to our residents, City staff is now assigned to remove the graffiti, pick up dead animals, maintain the downtown landscaping and make sure the OCTA bus stops throughout the City of Placentia are clean. The new phone number to report graffiti or dead animal pick up is (714) 993-8279.

Electric Vehicle Charging Station Installation at the Civic Center



Installation of new electric vehicle charging stations at the Civic Center has begun. In an effort to reduce fuel and maintenance costs, the City recently acquired 10 new Chevy Spark electric vehicles for use in day-to-day City operations. The new vehicles have replaced traditional gasoline vehicles in the City's fleet and the vehicles were purchased utilizing grant funds from the Air Quality Management District. Additional grant funds were awarded to the City for the installation of 12 new vehicle charging stations.



The charging stations are being installed along the northern edge of the Civic Center parking lot. Two of the charging stations will be made available for the general public's use while visiting or conducting business at the Civic Center. Work on this project began the week of February 1, 2016 with the removal of shrubbery and plant material and is expected to last one to two weeks. Once installed, the charging stations will keep the City's new electric vehicles on the road, providing various services to our community, while at the same time reducing long-term fuel and maintenance costs, as well as helping to reduce our carbon footprint.

Significant Events

February 3, 2016

At approximately 3:43 a.m., a male under the influence of methamphetamine locked himself in women's restroom of the Placentia Police Department's lobby. Placentia Police Officers forced entry into the restroom after the subject continually refused to open the door. After forcing entry into the restroom, the suspect charged out the door at Police Officers and fought with them on the lobby floor. The subject was restrained and subsequently arrested.

February 7, 2016

At 9:33 p.m., a Placentia Police Officer attempted a car stop at Bastanchury and Brookhaven and a short pursuit ensued. The driver drove south on Valencia through the El Dorado High School parking lot and then north on Valencia and into the residential tracts. The driver (35 year old male) eventually yielded in the 1700 block of Anderson and was taken into custody. Police Officers recovered methamphetamine that the driver threw out of the car at Shady Lane. The driver is currently on probation for drug sales and evading. The female passenger was also arrested for possession of hydrocodone and a no bail warrant for possession of dangerous drugs.


At 12:44 a.m., a Placentia Police Officer made contact with a suspicious male standing outside of a silver Mercedes Benz at Palm and Cedarlawn. When the Police Officer went to reposition his unit to obtain the plate number, the suspect fled. The Police Officer began pursuing the driver. The driver drove north on Wildcat Way into the parking lot of Brea High School. Brea and Placentia Police Department attempted to block the suspect, however, the suspect drove over a raised planter and sidewalk area, allowing himself to get back onto Lambert. The suspect went northbound on the 57 freeway at speeds topping 110 miles per hour. Police Officers lost radio communication with OCC dispatchers somewhere in the area of Brea Canyon/57 freeway. The Police Officers lost the suspect in San Dimas before the airship could get to them or Los Angeles Sheriff's Department's units could assist. The pursuit was terminated.


At 1:31 a.m. Placentia Police Department received a 911 call from a male claiming that he had been robbed and was being chased through Kraemer Memorial Park. Police Officers arrived within three minutes and were able to detain the suspect at Chapman and Main. The suspect, a Plas gang member, was arrested for robbery. The victim's wallet was located near the suspect and all of the money was accounted for.



BUILDING AND PLANNING DIVISION

1. Building plans and structural calculation analysis for a residential room addition and remodeling project located at Newton Street have been reviewed and approved by the Building and Planning Divisions on February 1, 2016. This project includes a new den next to the existing two-car garage, interior remodeling, new electrical and HVAC fixtures. The cost of the construction is \$45,000.
2. Eight (8) solar panel installation plans for residential homes were submitted and approved by the Building Divisions on February 1, 2016. These solar installation projects are for single-family detached homes only.
3. The second submittal of the architectural and structural plans for the new ten (10) unit condo project located at 1548 Spruce Street were submitted to the Planning and Building Divisions for second review on February 2, 2016. This project has two (2) five-unit buildings and each unit has 1,860 sq. ft. of living area with an attached two-car garage.
4. Tenant improvement plans for a nail salon (Sessy's Nail & Spa) located at 1160 East Imperial Highway were reviewed and approved by the Planning and Building Divisions on February 2, 2016. Scope of work includes interior offices, nail & hair stations, storage and restroom remodeling, new electrical, mechanical and HVAC systems. Cost of the construction is \$40,000.

Structure Fire – February 4 - At 5:58 p.m. units were dispatched to Gateway Court at University California Irvine for multiple reports of smoke on the first floor. Engine 4 arrived on scene and reported smoke showing from the five story library building. Engine 4 investigated and at 6:10 p.m. assumed UCI Incident Command, Battalion 5 assumed Incident Command one minute later. Truck 4 investigated smoke in the basement. Ending 28 announced primary all clear at 6:15 p.m. Engine 4 reported to the Incident Command a reduction in smoke, Battalion 5 canceled all units with the exception of fire station 4 units and Engine 28. Engine 28 continued to investigate a light odor of smoke on the first floor. At 6:33 p.m. Battalion 5 disbanded Incident Command and turned the scene over to Truck 4, the scene was left with the fire marshal at 6:58 p.m.

Corona

Remote Rescue – February 5 - At 4:11 p.m. Corona City Fire and Cal Fire Riverside requested the assistance of OCFA with a Remote Rescue in the area of the North Main Divide and Skyline Dr. Helicopter 1 arrived in the area at 4:31 p.m. and made a flat pitched landing several hundred yards from the patient to off load one medic and the crew chief. After an evaluation the rescuers reported the patient was a critical trauma with multiple leg fractures and would need transport to a trauma center. Helicopter 1 inserted the stokes basket and found a location to land and pick up a medic from Corona Engine 6 who had made it up to the Main Divide road. Once the patient was loaded into the stokes basket by the rescuers, with an IV, Helicopter 1 then hoisted the patient into the aircraft and flew direct to Orange County Global Medical Center, Santa Ana, arriving at approximately 5:15 p.m.

Buena Park

Structure Fire – February 5 - At 7:03 p.m. a Structure Fire response was dispatched to Orangethorpe Avenue in Buena Park. First arriving units found a two story commercial strip mall and began investigating smoke coming from the roof. With a possible roof and attic fire the Incident Commander requested the balance of the Working Structure Fire response. The Primary and Secondary All Clear were given at 7:18 p.m. and the fire was declared Under Control at 7:29 p.m. Buena Park PD and city building officials were requested to assist at the scene.

Laguna Beach

Remote Rescue – February 6 - At approximately 12:41 a.m., Helicopter 41 responded to a remote rescue call in the Laguna Beach Wilderness Park. A patient was located about 2 miles in on a trail with ground units still trying to ascertain patient location. Helicopter 41 flat pitched and reconfigured for a rescuer insertion. Helicopter 41 rescuer was inserted and made first patient contact with a 52-year-old female complaining of cramping. Patient was found to be stable. A 4-wheel drive, short wheel based, ranger vehicle was able to make it to within 100' of the patient. As the patient was stable and able to ambulate to the vehicle without further distress, it was determined that patient care be turned over to the Medic from Engine 51 who had accompanied the ranger, and have the patient driven back to the trail head for further assessment and care.

Structure Fire - February 6 - At 8:51 a structure fire response responded to Limewood in Irvine for a room and contents fire (bed on fire) caused by a dropped cigarette. Engine 36 was first to arrive on scene and investigate, balancing the response to a working structure fire moments later. Battalion 5 arrived on scene at 8:59 p.m. establishing Limewood Incident Command. The reporting party and resident was discovered to have minor burns at 9:11 p.m. and an ambulance was requested, Engine 28 was on scene and handled medical treatment; the patient signed AMA as was released at the scene. Primary all clear and knockdown occurred at 9:14 p.m.

Newport Beach

Remote Rescue – February 7 - At 8:57 a.m. Helicopter 1 was requested by Metro Net to respond to a remote rescue assignment in Crystal Cove State Park. Helicopter 1 coordinated with Newport Beach Fire Department units; who were already en route to the report of a possible full arrest in a remote area of the Laguna Coast Wilderness Park. Advanced Life Support ground resources from Newport Beach Fire arrived on scene nearly simultaneous with Helicopter 1 to find a lone adult male mountain biker, pulseless and apneic. Helicopter 1 inserted the on-duty rescue paramedic to assist ground resources and determine the safest, most efficient transport strategy. Due to the victims' location, a basket hoist extraction was quickly determined to be the best option to get the victim off scene without further risk of injury to the patient or assigned rescue personnel. Despite the efforts of the ALS resources, the patient failed to respond to initial resuscitation efforts and was pronounced dead at scene.

Midway City

Structure Fire - February 7 - At 3:49 p.m. a Structure Fire response was dispatched to Adams Street in Midway City. While units were en route the ECC continued to receive calls of an intensifying fire and also that there were possibly persons trapped in one of the apartments: two ambulances were added to the call. With this information Battalion 1 requested the balance of the Working Structure Fire response. First arriving units found two buildings on fire: one two story four-plex and a single story tri-plex. The Primary All Clear was given for both buildings at approximately 4 p.m. At 4:06 p.m. with the fire still working the Incident Commander requested the Second Alarm. At 4:34 p.m. the Incident Commander declared the fire Under Control. Red Cross, Edison, So. Cal. Gas, and county building officials were all requested to assist at the scene.

Traffic Collision Cut & Rescue – February 8 - At 9:17 p.m. a Traffic Collision Cut and Rescue response was dispatched to the area of El Morro Elementary School, on East Coast Highway in Newport Coast Unincorporated. With differing reports as to the number of patients and with some of them possibly being ejected from the vehicle the Incident Commander requested Heavy Rescue 6 and Truck 9 to be added to the incident. First arriving units found a two car accident and confirmed there were a total of five patients: one critical that had been ejected, one critical still in one vehicle, and three minor to moderate traumas due to mechanism. A total of four paramedic units, from Orange City, Newport Beach and Laguna Beach, and four ambulances, from Doctors and Care, were needed at the scene. All patients were transported to area hospitals for treatment and/or evaluation.
